

Database of licensed child care providers

- Data is self-reported
- Provider are asked to keep information current
- Only licensed programs (Licensing is not a guarantee of quality)
- Approximately 45% of licensed programs report they have training or experience caring for children with various special needs



Determine family's specific needs

- Information gathered from families by telephone or online at <u>www.ndchildcare.org</u>
- Data entered into the database
- Software does a "dating game" matching the family's needs to programs
- Options not limited because of special needs
- <u>Referrals must be objective and are never</u>
 <u>recommendations</u>


- Families receive personalized information
 - A customized referral listing of programs who have reported vacancies that match the family's request
 - CCR&R's Parent Guide, Finding and Using Child Care in North Dakota
 - An interview Checklist
 - Assorted brochures related to the ages and needs of the children and family



- In addition, families requesting care for a child with special needs receive
 - A Choosing High–Quality Child Care for a Child with Special Needs brochure
 - Top 10 Things You Need to Know About the ADA brochure
 - Family Voices brochures
 - Information related to the provider's training and experience

Training Services

- CCR&R is the primary source of training for child care providers in North Dakota
- All child care providers must complete state required Basic Child Care
 - 12 hours of training
 - CCR&R provides this training
 - Must be completed within 3 months of hire date or license date
- CCR&R partners with the ND Growing Futures System (states training registry system)
 - Choose training and educations to advance their professional development

ND CCR&R Training Formats

- Easy Reach Training free*, basic training that is 1– 3 hours in length and delivered via the internet 24/7
- Eager to Learn (ETL) Training more in depth online training. Instructor facilitated with a set online attendance schedule (usually once a week for six weeks)
- Face to Face Training Typically, full-day trainings or training series that are held in each region of the state

* Free on-line Easy Reach training is available until June 2013.

- Consultants are available to support child care programs
- Variety of focus areas:
 - Health and Safety
 - o Environments
 - o Child Behavior
 - o Working with Families
 - Curriculum and Activity Planning
 - o Business Practices
 - And much more...



Growing Child Care in ND 2011-2013

- Existing child care programs
 - Individualized training plan
 - Training and consultation linked
 - Formal assessments
 - Program improvement plans
 - Incentives (\$800 \$10,000)
 - Onsite Health Consultation
 - Special Health Care Plans
 - Emergency Preparedness
 - Personal Care Routines identified in assessments

Priority given to programs who serve children with special needs and/or Child Care Assistance

Child Care Recruitment

- New family/group providers
 - Pre-service training and consultation
 - \$800 start-up funds
 - Consultation for six months
- New centers
 - Consultation during investigation stage
 - Guidance for business plan development
 - \$9,500 to apply to implementation



What Parents Can Do...

- Open communication
 - Parents should clearly explain their wishes and provide information on problems, on changes at home, and about their child's routine, activities, and preference
- Parents should give respect to a provider as a professional
 - Taking care of children is an important profession and the provider plays an important role in their child's life
 - Invite them to be a part of the child's IEP or IFSP




What Providers Can Do...

- Ongoing communication
 - Updates on child's progress
 - Involvement of IEP's or IFSP's
- Acceptance of a parent as the expert in the child's life
- Assurance
 - The child is in a safe and healthy environment
